## New Director, New Era for Chetek Kids Club

In 2008, the Chetek Kids Club began under the umbrella of the Chetek-Weyerhaeuser School District with the aim of providing a quality child-care center for area families. This month, the Chetek Kids Club enters a new era after the original director, Connie Weis, is stepping down and handing the reins over to long-time Kids Club assistant director Spring Hernandez.

CWASD opted to form an in-school child-care facility in 2008, hoping to meet what they felt was a need for affordable, quality child care in the community that served all ages of children. At the time, it was one of the first school districts in the state to do so. Weis was hired that spring to lead the new Chetek Kids Club. She started with just two other teachers working with school-age students. It wasn't long before they expanded to serving toddlers and infants later that year and hired additional staff to take on

the influx of children. From then on, as they say, the rest is history.

Last fall, Weis decided it was time for a change, and opted to take a position as a reading paraprofessional within CWASD. She slowly has phased out of her position as Kids Club Director over this school year and has now officially handed over the reins to Hernandez, who was named the new director in January.

"I love the kids club and all it stood for," said Weis. "But I was ready to cut back. It's been special seeing the program grow and move forward, and know that we have filled a need and that families and kids are happy. To see the Kids Club from its infancy to it flourishing as it is now is great. It was hard to decide to leave at first, but I know the Kids Club will be fine. They are in good hands."

As she reflects on her time with the Chetek Kids Club, Weis also adds that she couldn't imagine forming the facility with any other district than CWASD.

"The district has always been supportive," notes Weis. "They've always been open and listened to me. They were there every step of the way. Many other districts have rippled off what we've done here, and many are looking to do the same thing. So many of them have come and said 'This makes sense!"

Hernandez, for her part, is no stranger to the Chetek Kids Club family. She has been a part of the Chetek Kids Club almost since its inception in 2008. Over the years she has gained extensive experience in child care, originally working part time before being named assistant director of Chetek Kids Club a couple of years into her tenure at the facility. She received

**Stock Market Club Investing in Student Futures** 

It's hard enough to navigate the economy these days; it's even harder to try and read the stock market and maneuver investments. Some CW students, however, are doing just that-with a pretty special knackwith the new Stock Market Club.

The goal of the stock market club is to educate CW students on what stock is, and how outside variables influence stock performance. This is done by competing in a virtual competition known as the Stock Market Game on the Wall Street Journal webpage. Students participating receive \$100,000 of fictitious money to invest at the beginning of the year. The overall winner of the game is the student who puts together a portfolio that performs the best by the end of the year.



According to club advisor John Loy, stu-

dents in this club meet weekly to discuss strategies and variables they feel are currently moving stock prices. They also discuss what is most likely to affect stocks within their portfolios in the future. Loy also shares weekly educational tidbits with the students on topics like dividends, market indexes, short selling, and margins. Most of the dialogue at meetings is directed by the club president or the members themselves. Occasionally, the club may make a weekly portfolio rule to challenge the current standings.

It's a unique club, and many of the individuals taking part in the simulation are just looking for something different to do during the day. According to sophomore club member Jack Morneau, it's not a club that you'd think a lot of people their age would be interested in, but they are.

"It seems complicated when you first sit down," says Morneau, "but it really isn't."

"It's a life skill," adds sophomore Luccas Janota.

So far this year, CWHS sophomore and club president Jacob Moen has nearly quadrupled the initial \$100,000 in fictitious investments with gains of close to \$400,000. Junior Austin Bitney has more than doubled his. Not every student is as lucky and adept at maneuvering the market, but it's given all of them a taste of how investing in stocks can work for or against you.

Moen explains that he's been able to do well in the market by short selling stocks. Short selling is basically borrowing or holding a set share of stocks when they are very high, but speculating that they'll decline. The investor then will buy back to cover the short sale when prices drop. So, the trader is betting that the prices will continue to decline and can then purchase them back at a lower price. At that point, they will get a return on their investment and make money. While they are betting on other people's losses, it is a pretty common practice for experienced investors—one that actually keeps the market moving.

What is their secret? It's anyone's guess. Moen spends quite a bit of time throughout the week gauging the market and watching trends. He looks for patterns and has become pretty adept and figuring out when he can buy and sell.

"Morning is the best time [for short selling] because that is when the market is the most unstable," explains Moen. "Then it recovers during the day. That is when you want to cover your short sale and buy back. [and you can make your money back]."

The club members all agree that it's about trial and error and having patience. It also takes research and keeping an eye on current events to determine if there's something coming up which might increase a particular company's profits.

It sounds like a lot of jargon, and the average person trying to make sense of it will have a difficult time keeping up. Nonetheless, the students—and Moen in particular—seem to have caught on to patterns that have allowed them to do quite well. So well, in fact, that Loy says in the years he has participated in this "game" he's never seen anyone get such a large return on their investment. For him, it's been pretty exciting to see these students figuring it out.

The club is seeking small donations for prizes at the end of the competition (gas cards, food coupons, etc.) If anyone is willing to donate a small prize, club members are willing to visit the patron and share more about what they have learned.  $( \bullet )$

her director's credentials about 10 years ago. Between her and her husband, they have eight children, most of whom went through the Chetek-Weyerhaeuser school system. They've also had experience in foster care. She is certainly no stranger to the community and to working with children.

"Spring has been my right-hand gal for years," relays Weis. "She knows the kids and the families and will be great in this position. And she knows she always has me in her court and can talk to me if she needs to."

Taking Hernandez's place at Chetek Kids Club as the new assistant director will be Hannah Holst. Holst is a 2018 Barron High School graduate and knew early on that childcare was a passion; even before she finished high school, she became a certified childcare teacher. She attended UW-Stout in Menomonie and received a Bachelor's Degree in Human Development and Family Studies, with a Concentration in Child Life. While in high school and through part of her college career, she worked at Creative Kids in Barron.

"I'm really looking forward to getting to know the children, their families, and helping the community grow," says Holst. "Spring and I will work well together and I'm excited to be here."

Hernandez plans to spend the next few weeks getting her feet wet in the new position, and fully admits that she and Holst will be learning together. Although Hernandez doesn't plan to change the Kids Club operations too much, she does hope she can add more programming with the school-age program—especially over the summer. Hernandez believes the Chetek Kids Club currently serves around 100 families; there are 40-45 kids just in the after-school program. They work with youths as young as six weeks up until the end of their fifth-grade year. Hernandez adds that the Chetek Kids Club is filled to the brim, with wait lists for new families. The weight of serving such a large number of people is not lost on her.

"I want families to feel comfortable leaving their kids here, knowing they are being taken care of and that our hearts are fully in this," notes Hernandez. "They can know they don't have to question the care of their kids."

Hernandez is also fully aware that taking over the reins from Weis is a big job. Weis created the Chetek Kids Club from the ground up, and after so many years together, it'll be bittersweet for both ladies.

"After 14 years with Connie, I'm going to greatly miss working with her," admits Hernandez. "It's going to be different. I have some very big shoes to fill!"

"I can't talk about it long without getting emotional," admits Weis. "The Chetek Kids Club will always be a special place for me. I'll miss it!"

#### **CWMS Student Pens Winning 9/11 Essay**

Anyone old enough to remember can vividly recall where they were on Sept. 11, 2001 as terrorists attacked the United States and left more than 3,000 Americans dead. It's been more than 20 years since that day, and students attending Chetek-Weyerhaeuser Area School District aren't old enough to remember the events of September 11, 2001; the seniors of the graduating class of 2022 weren't even born yet. One young CWMS student, however, made it a priority to learn about that fateful day through an essay contest. In the process, she earned a first-place prize and discovered a little more about what it was like to experience those events from those closest to her.

Kelsea Clark, an eighth-grader at CWMS, entered a 2021 essay contest sponsored by the Richard I. Bong Veterans Historical Center based in Superior, WI. CWHS/MS Social Studies teacher John Loy brought the contest to his students' attention during a class last fall. Clark was the only student who decided to partake. To recognize the importance of remembering Sept. 11, 2001, the center asked the essayists the following questions: "What changes to our lives and freedoms were generated by the attacks on September 11th, 2001? How do the events of that day continue to affect even those, like you, who may have no memory of it?"

"I thought it would be pretty cool to do," notes Clark. "My grandparents and parents were around when it happened, and I thought it would be nice to learn more about it."

The focus on her essay was how Sept. 11 changed and impacted the lives of Americans. In order to dive deeper into this topic, Clark spoke with her family. She learned that they were all watching the television that day as things unfolded, and all expressed fear and anger. She also learned how, as a result of the terrorist attack, American troops were sent to Afghanistan to locate the mastermind behind the plot, Osama Bin Laden.

"I got info on how my family reacted and what it was like for them," notes Clark. "It really helped me understand the day a lot more." Clark spent a couple of weeks in November crafting her essay, with a little help from



Loy. It was due early in December. By early January, Clark admits she was getting a little nervous and anxious as she awaited the contest results. On January 26, she discovered she'd won; to say she was excited would be an understatement.

"I started jumping and screaming," exclaimed Clark. "I was bawling my eyes out. I couldn't believe it. It had been so long since I turned it in that I was getting worried."

As a result of her first-place essay, Clark received \$50. But more importantly, she received insight into a day that forever changed the United States of America. When asked if she'd participate in a contest like this again, she answered with a resounding "Yes!" Although, she admits she might pick a different topic.
